Wednesday, Jan. 11 Movie Group will discuss two films that members watch at home before the meeting. The first film is "Fire in the Mountains" about a mother who toils to build a road in a mountainous Himalayan village to take her son to physiotherapy. Yet her husband, who believes that a shamanic ritual is the remedy, stands in her way. The film is presented in Hindi with subtitles.

The second film, "At Eternity's Gate" is inspired by true events. Famed but tormented artist Vincent van Gogh spends his final years in Arles, France, painting masterworks of the natural world that surrounds him. Both films are available on Amazon Prime Video for a small fee.

Saturday, Jan. 14 Met Opera Live: "Fedora." Join Penny Roberts at the AMC Hoffman theater for the new production of Umberto Giordano's "Fedora," part of the Metropolitan Opera's award-winning Live in HD series. A senior ticket is \$25.50 and can be purchased online or at the box office when you arrive. You must pick your seat at the time of your purchase. If you wish to sit with the group, choose a seat in the fifth (5th) row from the front close to the left aisle. Garage parking is available.

AHA Directory in your inbox

AHA used to provide a printed member directory to each member household twice a year. Four years ago, toward our goal of reducing paper use and postage costs, we began providing the directory online through AHA Hub instead. We realize some members would prefer to have a printed directory—and that our online directory defaults to a small font size that is difficult to read if you simply hit "print." Beginning this month, we will provide a formatted and easy-to-read member directory by email with a direct link so that you can print the directory at home—or just keep it in your email inbox for referral. We will send this in early January and in early July each year.

A Salute to Change Agent -Kathie Fricke

Kathie Fricke has been the treasurer of AHA since January 2019, when she first joined the AHA Board of Directors. One of her first acts was to change the accounting method from the accrual basis to a cash basis, a move that simplified the accounting process.

With the pandemic shutdown in 2020, Kathie – along with Cele Garrett – handled the complicated process of applying for Payroll Protection Plan (PPP) funds to help sustain AHA during that time. The application was successful, and Kathie monitored the expenditures and filed the necessary reports to have the loan completely forgiven.

Kathie sought a new bookkeeping firm to better handle the finances and monthly reporting. On the advice of AHA finance committee, which she chairs, she reinvested AHA's assets in a series of Certificates of Deposit (CD) that mature at staggered dates, allowing more flexibility in accessing the funds without penalty, if needed. Most recently, she worked to find a better banking relationship that provides more convenient services and now allows for automatic deposit of checks into AHA's account. The net result of these changes has been to streamline and simplify all the financial processes. Since October, she has worked to train her successor, John Veldhuis, to assure a smooth transition when her term ends at the end of December. Fortunately, she will continue to serve on the AHA board and its finance committee. The board and staff thank her for her extraordinary service and accomplishments.

Important: COVID-19 Test Kits

You may have heard that each U.S. household now can receive four COVID-19 test kits at no charge. As with previous offers, the kits will be shipped straight to your door. If you have not already done so, visit COVID.gov. On the home page, under the blue header **Testing**, click the link to order your tests.

The expiration dates for many at-home OTC (over the counter) kits have been extended. The Food and Drug Administration has provided a table of the most common brands of test kits, where you can check the manufacturer and test name shown on the box label of your test. **AHA's January 1 eBlast will contain the direct link to the FDA.gov page.** (The link is so long that including it in this printed newsletter would not be helpful.) Or you can type "at-home OTC Covid 19 test" in your search engine and scroll down past the Ad-supported links. One of the first links you find should be the FDA.gov page (At-Home OTC COVID-19 Diagnostic Tests – FDA).

Once you get to the table, you'll find the row that matches the manufacturer of the tests you are looking for. The FDA will update this table as shelf-life extensions are authorized. To see complete information on smaller screens, select the blue plus (+) button beside the test name.
